

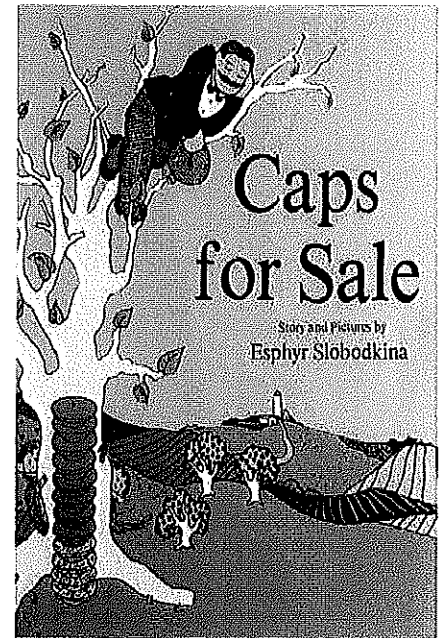


Caps for Sale

One day he stops under a tree to take a nap. When he wakes up, the gray, brown, blue, and red caps have all disappeared! The only one left is his own checked cap. Where on earth can the others be?

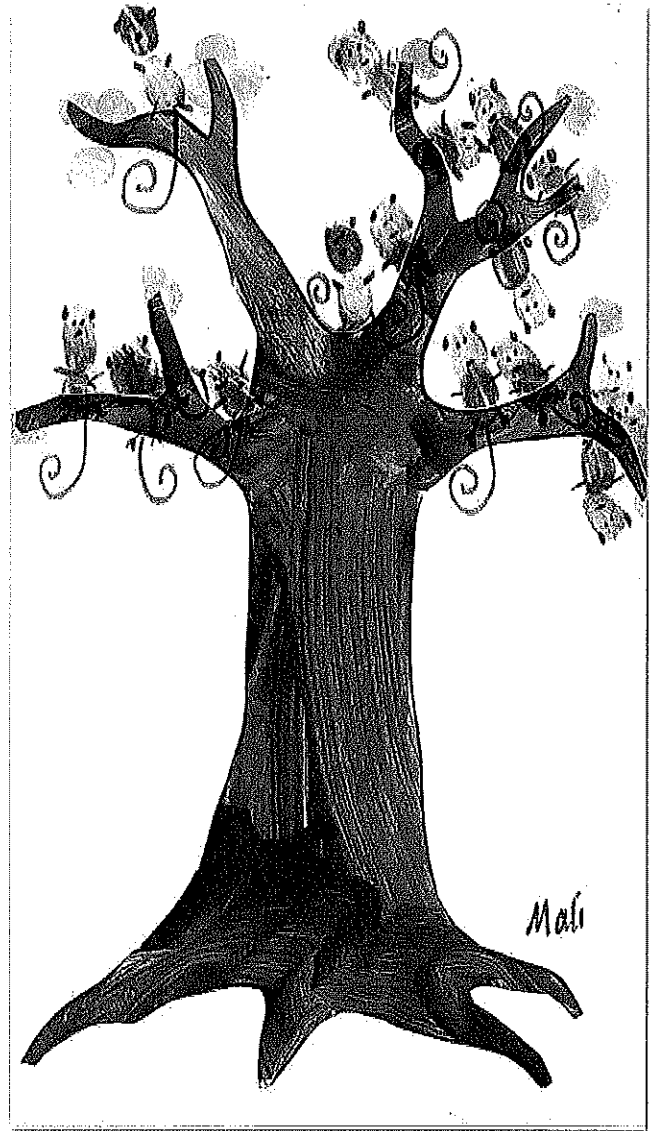

Hints for Reading Aloud: Caps for Sale is a popular read aloud due to its repetitive text which allows children to speak the lines and join in the reading experience. Your child will certainly be delighted to add a little drama as you read. Your child may want to take on the roll of the monkeys by repeating the actions of the peddler (shaking their finger, stamping their feet, etc.) Help to develop your child’s vocabulary and comprehension by explaining new words (such as peddler, caps, wares, and country). After several readings, your child may take on the role of the peddler. As you read pause and allow your child to fill in the peddlers lines. If you have a class of children, act out the story using paper plate caps that the children have previously colored.

Monkey's in the Tree

Art Activity

- Have your child paint or color in the tree. (Tree can be drawn by you or the child)
- Have your child dip their fingertip in a small amount of paint and press twice to make the monkey. Use green paint for the leaves.
- Your child can then add as much detail to the monkeys as they wish using paint, markers or crayons!

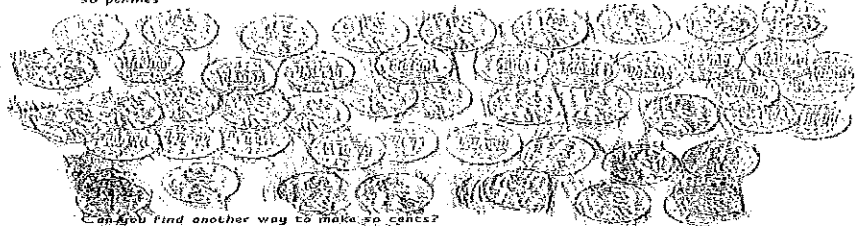

Music player, music, a cap

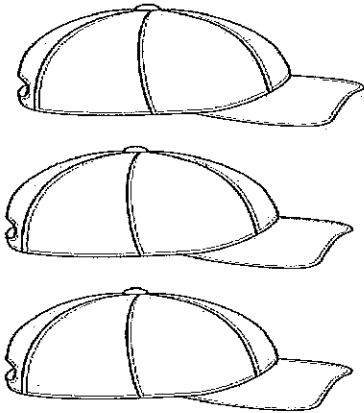
Activity Detail:

Put on some fun music and take turns being the "peddler." Pass the cap around to the children. The child wearing the cap is the peddler and can decide what action to do during the music being played. They can clap, jump, spin, shake hips, shake hands, hop, roll, etc. The "monkeys" job is to imitate what the peddler is doing. Monkey see, monkey do! Take turns and see how creative you can be. Kids LOVE to be imitated and to imitate, even little ones. This activity can be done with 2 or more people/children.



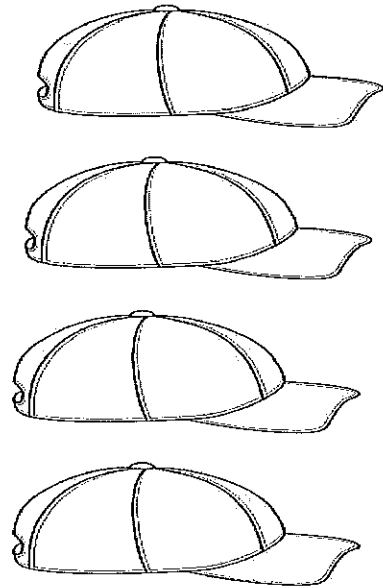

Mini chocolate chip cookies

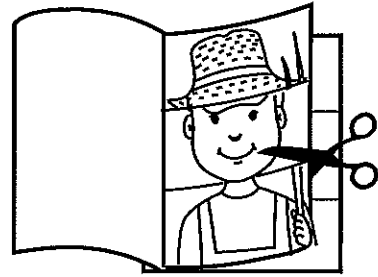
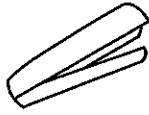
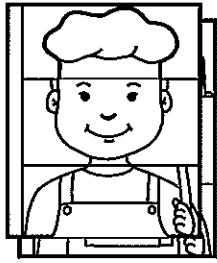
Whipped cream

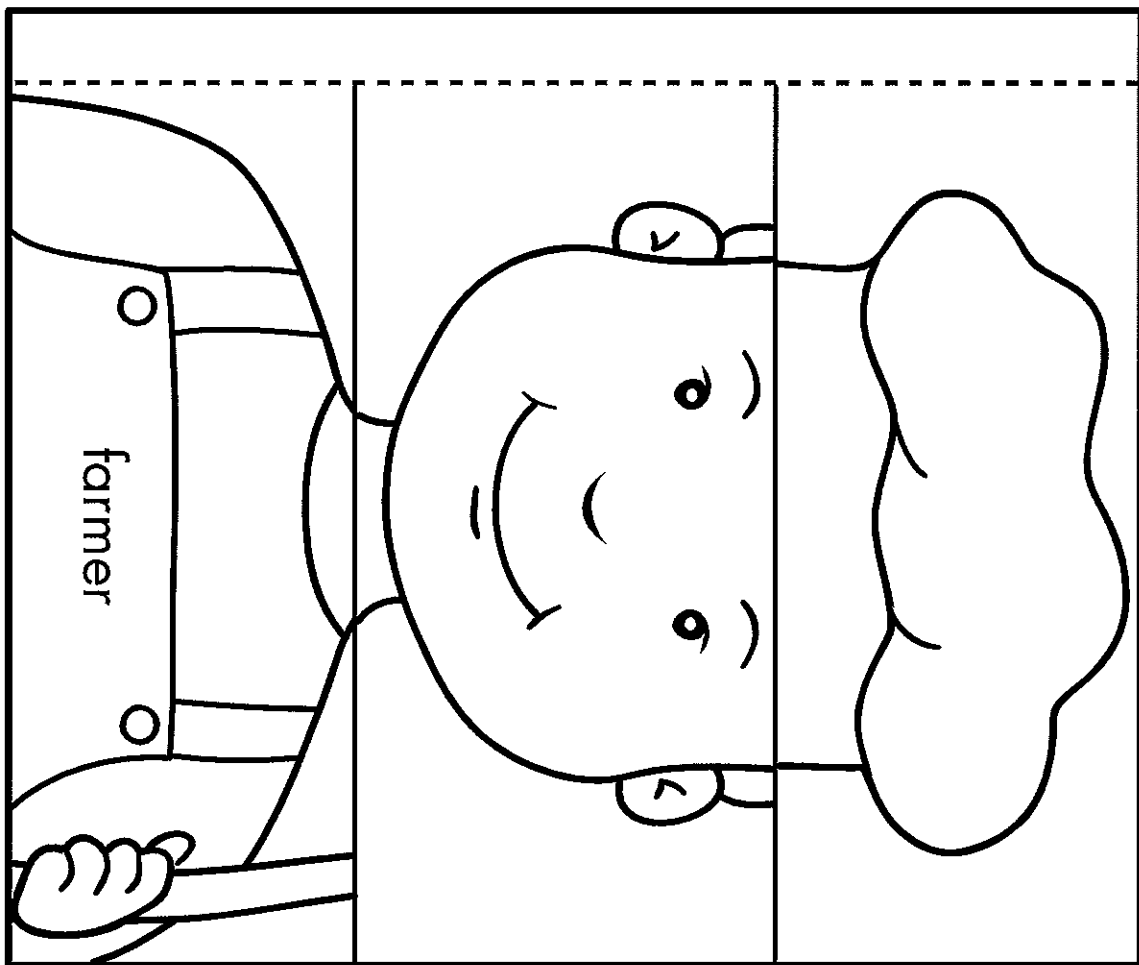

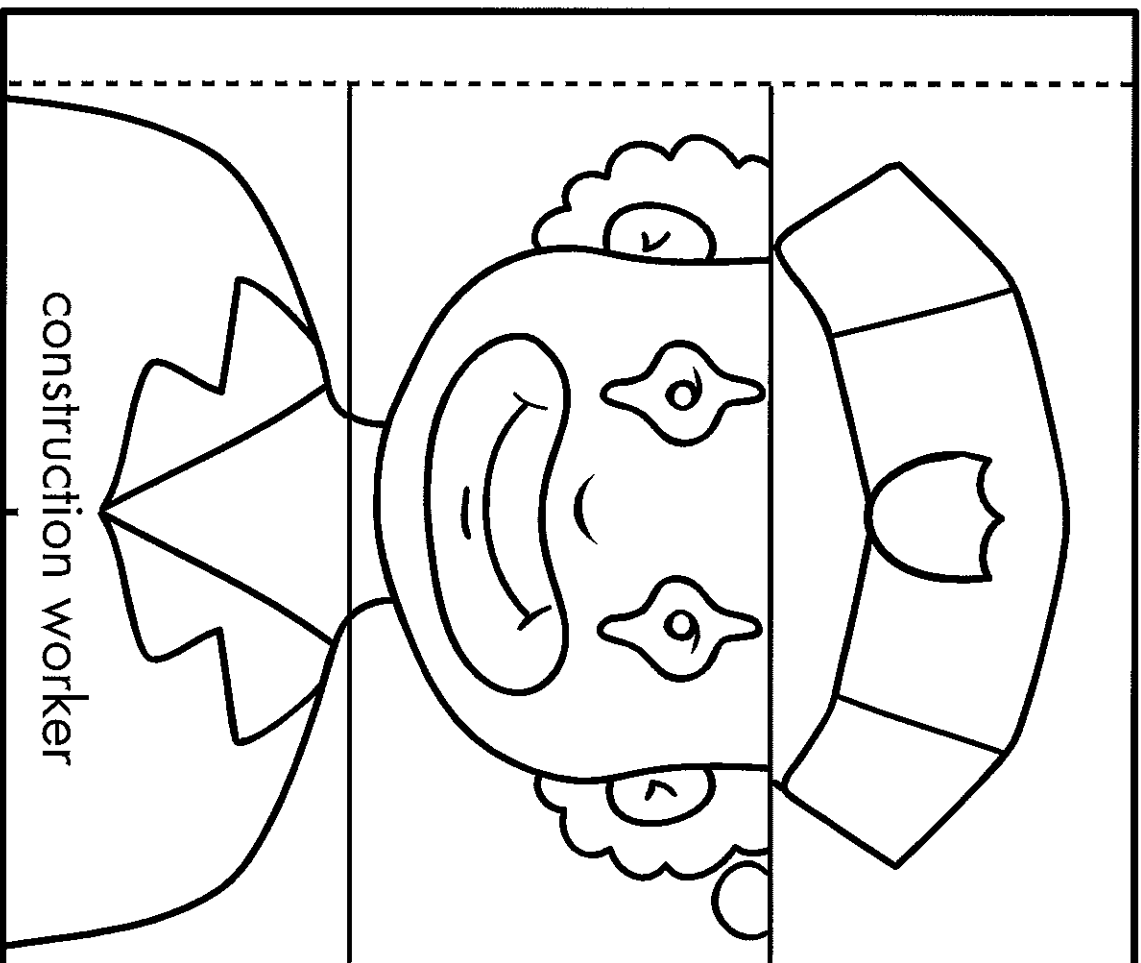
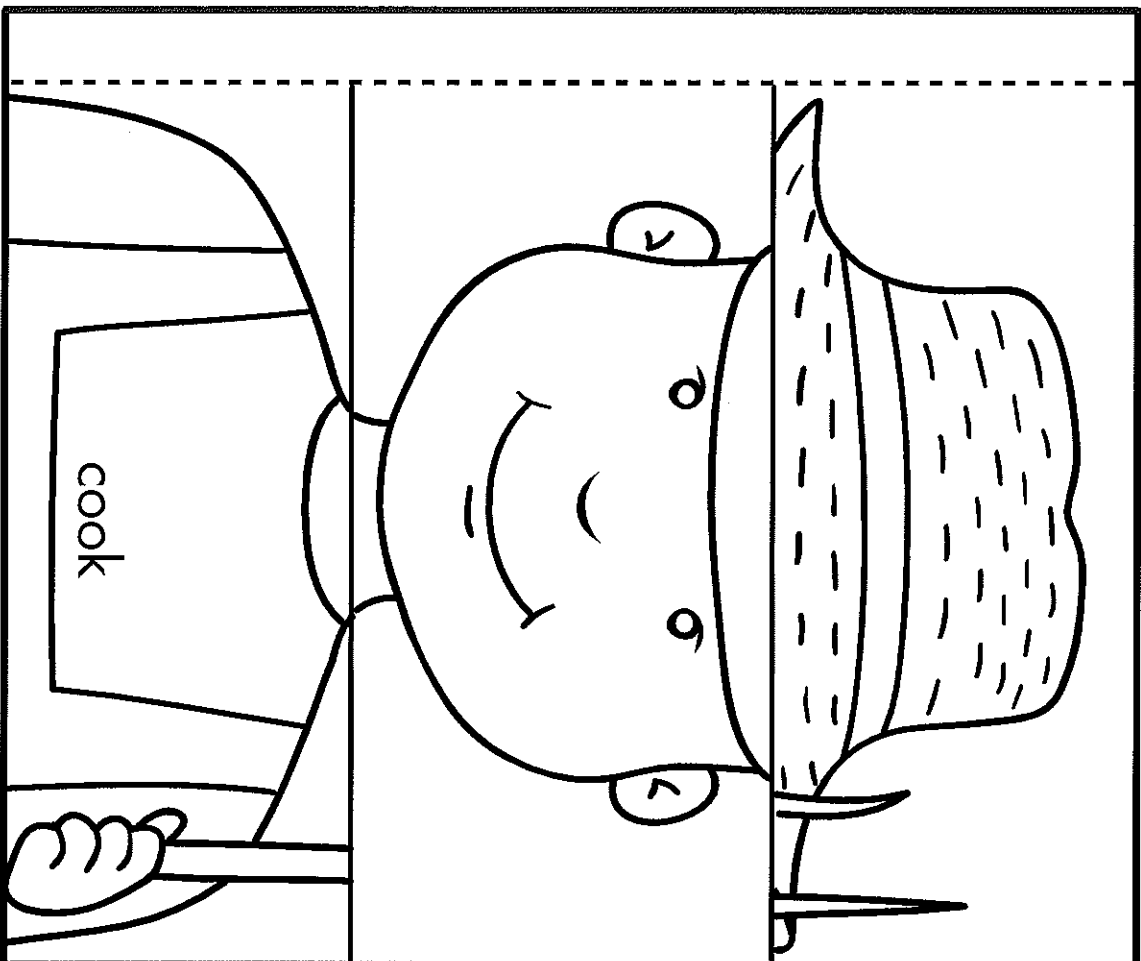
Stack all the pages and staple them together.

Cut the middle pages of the book along the line, forming three sets of pages.

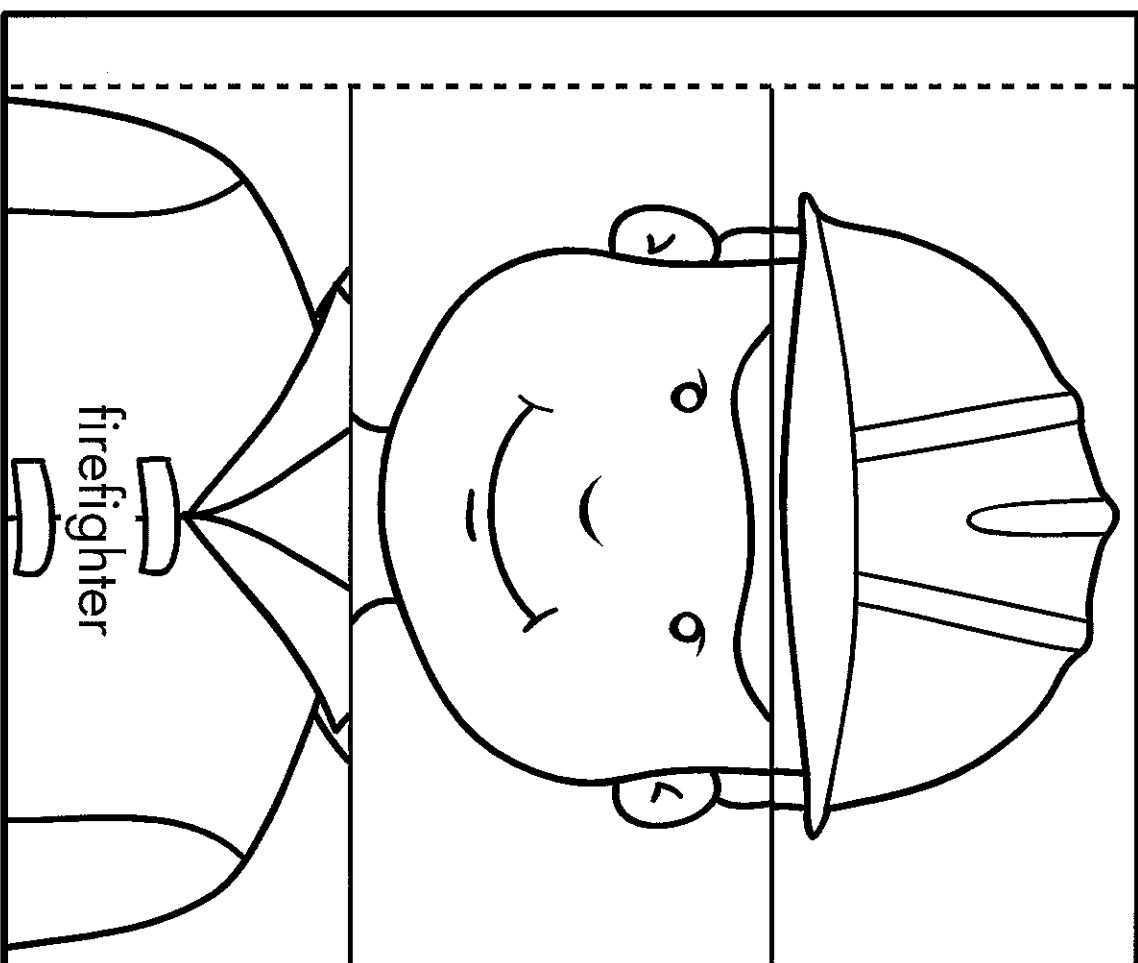
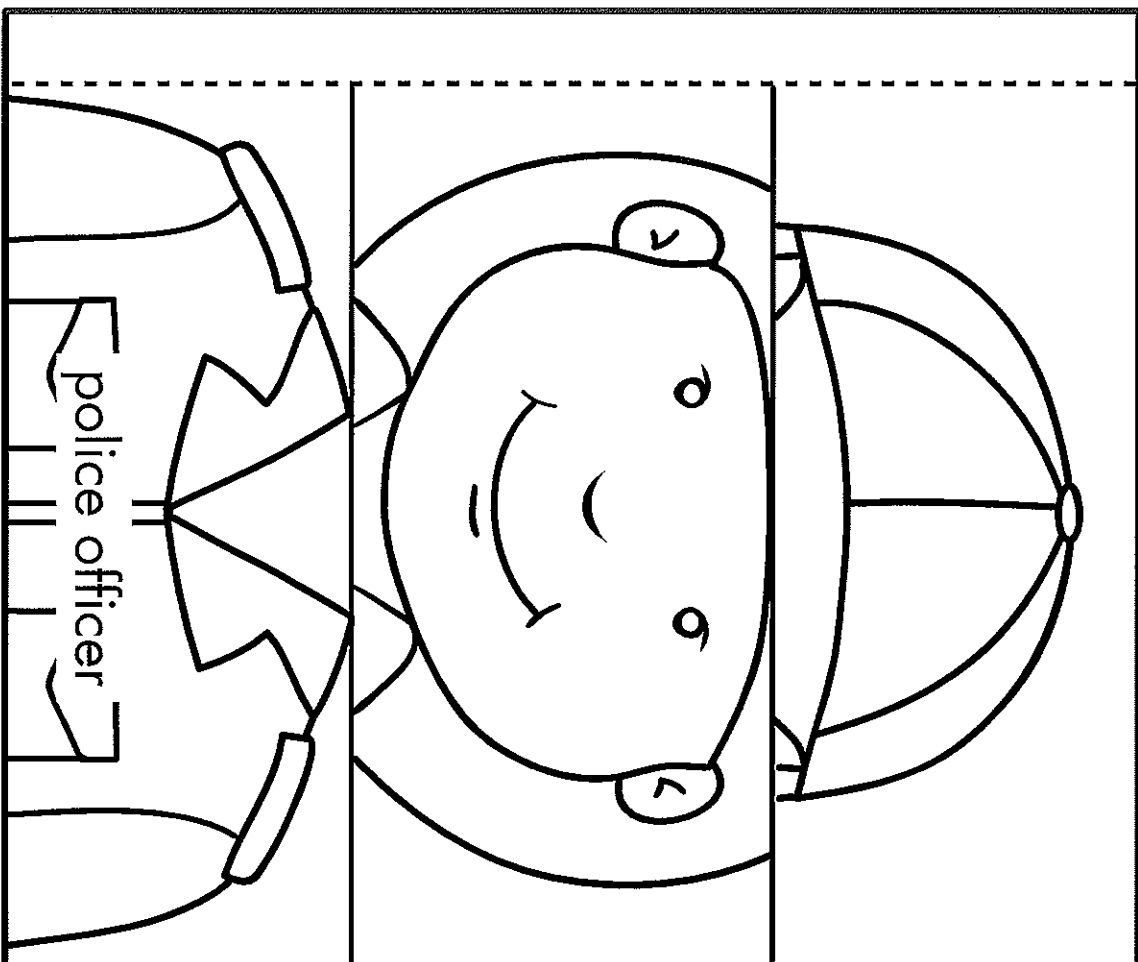

TIPS:

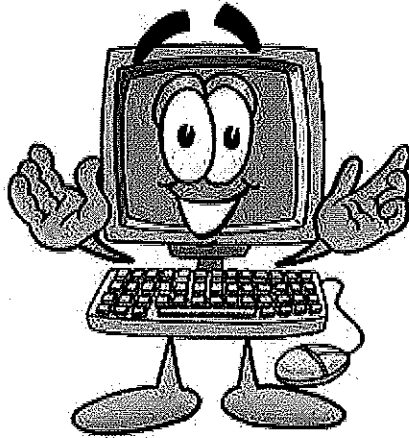
- Your child will feel empowered by having their very own card and thus building the responsibility of caring for the books until they are returned.
- One backpack or reusable bag per child. Allow him to fill it up, choosing the books that interest him. Believe me they can't wait to get home and get to read their NEW books!
- Facilitate good book choice. Suggest some books you think your child might enjoy or show her a new section – maybe the graphic novels or the non-fiction craft section.
- Make the library visit as fun as possible. We like to eat cookies and read our books after a visit for extra library fun!

Check your local library for specific guidelines for children's library cards. If your library has an age restriction for opening a card then make sure you have one for your child to use.



A library card equals reading independence. It's empowering!
